## **2. Copyright Amendment Bill**

The Parliament of Australia has passed the Copyright Amendment (Disability Access and Other Measures) Bill 2017. From 1 January 2019, unpublished materials will be out of copyright 70 years after the death of the creator.

The changes enabled by the Copyright Amendment (Disability Access and Other Measures) Bill 2017:

- Simplify the statutory licences for education and make it easier for students to access material and extend the exception for exams to online exams
- Simplify and update provisions that enable libraries and other collecting institutions to make ‘preservation copies’ of material in their collections such as manuscripts
- Introduce a fixed term of protection for unpublished works (that are currently covered by copyright indefinitely) making it easier for libraries to exhibit material to the Australian public
- Simplify and update the provisions that allow accessible format versions for people with disabilities

### **3. Australian Golf Heritage Society Oral History Project**

Recognising the need to record its living history, the Society initiated its Oral History Project in 2013. ### **4. Accredited Oral History Training**

A nationally accredited oral history training can be delivered over two days by Dr Elaine Rabbitt (PhD oral history) and WA Oral History President Doug Ayre. Elaine has developed the oral history training package for [AHCILM404](#) Record and document Community History, drawn from the wealth of oral history teaching materials that are available in Australia and overseas. Elaine Rabbitt is giving Queensland the opportunity to complete this training. If participants also have a Certificate IV in Training & Assessment they will be able to then teach others this course.
